talented team from Waimea has brought a homeowner's vision to life, creating a minimalist "Industrial Zen" residence that takes full advantage of the aweinspiring rural views.


"I've never done a home like this before," said Waimea architect Clem Lam. "The homeowner played a big part in the design and had a clear vision of what she wanted. It's all about the geometry. I really like the way it turned out."

Situated on one acre with two beautiful pu'u (hills) on one side and an unobstructed view of Mauna Kea on the other, the four-bedroom 2,500-square-foot home, completed in October 2018, reveals majestic panoramas from most every room in the house. In the great room, the ceiling reaches 15 feet in height. The towering sliding-glass doors, crowned with a series of transom windows,

perfectly frame the farmlands and foothills that stretch to the slopes of Mauna Kea. Skylights and large picture windows help usher natural light throughout.

"I like the way the daylight works in the house so that it's not all coming from one source," said Clem. "It's still very light inside even on foggy days. Just outside the bedroom, there's an entire wall made of translucent polycarbonate that brings diffused light into the space."










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Interior designer Sue Moss, of Trans-Pacific Design in Waimea, sourced and selected the lighting, fixtures, veneers, backsplash and paint colors. The kitchen combines stainless steel and wood accents that carry out the Asian-fusion industrial theme. Grouped in a bundle, industrial Edison light bulbs hang from long cords above the square island, which is topped with a thin sheet of brushed stainless steel.

"The backsplash behind the Bluestar range is a think brick tile produced by Fireclay Tile," said Sue. "The paint colors in the home are all based on that color. We chose industrial-style pipes that hold up the shelves. Gary Aguirre, of Gary's Custom Cabinets & Fine Furniture in Waimea, did all the cabinetry and doors. He did such a beautiful job with the clear vertical grain. It all matches perfectly."

Sue sourced the lighting from Aloha Lighting in Kailua-Kona. Stretching across the great room, the Tech-brand wire cable track lights are low-wattage

and can be turned any direction to cast even lighting across the space. An accent wall made of corrugated metal adds to the industrial aesthetic, as do the polished concrete floors that replicate the color of the concrete floors at Costco.

Construction materials including lumber, roofing and siding came from HPM Building Supply in Waimea. The contractors for the project, Quality Builders of Waimea, began the build process by constructing 2' x 6' seed wall. Structural engineer Afaq Sarwar is also from Waimea.

"The exterior siding is panelized fiber cement board," said Clem. "The fibers are compressed into the cement. It's non-flammable and won't rot. Fitting the panels into the framing was like putting together a puzzle."

The home's exterior is oriented to accommodate the views as well as protect from the elements on Waimea's wet and windy "green side." The low, single pitch of the shed roof sends rainwater to one side and protects from wind on the other side.

Now that the home is complete, the homeowner and her parents will enjoy the low-maintenance, no-fuss, easily accessible living space. There's even a ceramics studio attached to the garage that opens to the outside via an industrial roll-up door.

In addition to the home's three bathrooms, the "dog wash" shower in the garage was designed specifically for the homeowner's Border Collie, "Momo." The cool concrete floors, abundance of natural light and one acre of fenced yard is a dog's dream-come-true.

"The dog loves the house," said Clem. "She felt right at home the minute she moved in and took over.'





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
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
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






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hey are a lot of fun," said Marga

To create her bags, Marga uses everything from placemats, ties and belts to gloves, curtains, baskets, pillowcases and vintage Hawaiian shirts. She seeks undiscovered treasures at the Goodwill, garage sales and second-hand stores. She also crafts hand-beaded leather guitar straps that are as

intricate and ornate as they are flashy and fun.

A longtime Kona resident since 1976, Marga has led a fascinating and colorful life. A hippie chick in the '60s, she was pals with Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin and other rock legends via an ex-husband/musician who played in bands in San Francisco. "Jimi was a sweet person, very humble," she said. "Janis was a lot of fun."

After becoming a clinical hypnotist, she worked with the Olympic ski team, athletes, students and schoolchildren, helping clients overcome fears and anxiety.

On the one-year anniversary of Michael's passing last month, Marga hosted a music and fashion event in his honor at Kona Oceanfront Gallery, where Michael's cigar-box guitars and ukes are on display alongside Marga's gig bags.

"I began the art of bag making to make cases for Michael's instruments," she said. "I feel like I'm continuing the tradition exemplified in his work, that is, a sensitivity to the 'aina by using recycle, redeemed and repurposed materials to create unexpected works of art."




